Adoptions

We have adopted out a record number of cats and kittens for 2023. From January 1 to May 15, we placed 214 cats and kittens.



Heather Steinmann has a rich history with Furry Friends.

She and her husband Jon joined the cat rescue organization about nine years ago after they adopted a kitten and its Mamma from the non-profit. When the couple learned that Furry Friends had a shelter, Heather said, "Oh there's somewhere I can volunteer, and I started." "I love Furry Friends," she said. "I love the organization."

Heather now volunteers as a shift lead for three or four hours on alternate Saturday evenings. During her years as a volunteer, she has performed a variety of tasks, including pet transportation and substituting. For about two years, she did voice mail—responding to voice mail.

"I feel good when the cats are adopted," she said. "It makes me happy when they're going into a loving home."

She also enjoys learning about each cat's personality. "It's a little challenging to see what makes each cat tick."

Heather and Jon share their Hockinson home with a large array of animals: Three cats, a dog, eight chickens, a cockatoo, and a dove. In addition, Jon owns a horse that he enjoys riding.

Here is a report from one foster parent who was caring for 28 kittens. How many cans does it take to feed 28 kittens and cats a day?

- Morning feeding- 17 cans (4 cans for our cats + 13 for babies)
- Lunch for growing babies- 6 to 9 cans
- Dinner for growing babies- 6 to 9 cans
- Roughly 30 35 cans a day! Plus dry food for free feeding.

We feed the kittens Purina Pro Plan Kitten Chicken & Rice Formula dry food and Purina Pro Plan Focus Kitten Ocean Whitefish & Tuna Entrée canned cat food. If you would like to help the babies, we sure would love some donations of this brand of kitten food. One of the reasons we've been on hold for owner relinquishments is because we decided to roll up our sleeves and do some hard work... taking care of a hoarding situation that we were alerted to. Over the last several months, we took in over 23 cats and kittens to nurse back to health and get them ALL spayed/neutered. The process is slow and requires a maximum amount of patience while we convince the owner to let us help them with their situation. People often ask, "how does someone become a hoarder?" The truth is that there is no one answer. More often than not, the person who becomes a hoarder started out with a wish to "rescue" a stray cat or two... two becomes four... and if none of them is fixed, that number quickly multiplies. Before the owners know it, they are in over their heads with cats they wanted to help initially but now no longer have the means to care for.

All in all, helping this 23-cat hoarding situation cost Furry Friends around \$7,000. We but someone must help these people... help these cats... and help control our local cat population. As this effort comes to an end, we are already taking in over 40 cats from another hoarding situation. As you can imagine, we will spend upwards of \$20,000.

Responsible Rescuing Versus Rescuing Them to Death

I know it seems really contradictory to say not all rescuing is responsible rescuing. To rescue means "to save," so how can anyone 'saving' an animal not be doing what is right?

Responsible rescuing means you have the resources to be able to provide at least the basic life sustaining and medical care for each animal you save. You must have the means physically, mentally, and financially to provide for the animals you are taking in. You need clean water, fresh wet & dry food, parasite prevention and control, necessary vet visits, enrichment, spaying/neutering/vaccinating, and clean and adequate living environments.

The caretaker must have the proper mental head space to be able to give of yourself to those who cannot help themselves. Another aspect of responsible rescuing is not taking kittens away from their moms too early unless there is absolutely no other way for the kittens to survive. They have the best chance of survival with their mothers. Responsible rescuing means living up to what you are promising these defenseless animals from day 1 all the way through finding them a loving home.

This is Muffin. After being dumped at a feral cat colony by her previous owners, Muffin was trapped and sent to Furry Friends for saving. Her story starts out normally: she gets to the shelter, has her first medical appointment, gets scheduled for a spay and was supposed to be ready for adoption shortly after that! Unfortunately, Muffin started vomiting blood at the shelter soon after she was fixed. Fosters Tanika and Mike took her home for a week while she received meds for what the vet thought was an ulcer.

After that one-week watch period, she was eating and drinking normally, so we proceeded to find her a forever home and she was adopted! But her story doesn't end there... a few weeks after her adoption she started urinating blood and vomiting again! The new adoptive family took her to the vet immediately and that's when they concluded that Muffin was going through kidney failure. With this new revelation, and the costs associated with it, the family wasn't able to continue to care for her, and she was returned to Furry Friends.

Even though Muffin is only a year old, she has one kidney no longer functioning and the other is slowly shutting down. For the first few weeks back with fosters Tanika and Mike she barely ate anything, but after about 6 weeks with them she is doing much better! She is eating/drinking great and spends a majority of her time lounging on the couch.

Muffin will remain with Furry Friends until her final days... getting all the love, snuggles and pets by our amazing Fosters... but she won't live a very long life. All we can do is make sure she's comfortable and happy while she's here with us.

To date, we have spent over \$4,000 to help diagnose, save and provide as much comfort to Muffin as possible. What is FIP?

Feline Infectious Peritonitis (FIP) is an aberrant reaction to an infection with the Feline Coronavirus. Feline Coronavirus is quite common; most cats that become infected develop a mild gastrointestinal illness and recover uneventfully. Unfortunately, the cats that develop FIP do so likely because their particular intestinal virus mutates in a way that allows it to penetrate other bodily tissues. Additionally, their body's response to the viral infection is inappropriate. Since there are currently no tests able to distinguish between the normal (more mild) intestinal form of Feline Coronavirus, and the mutated (more intense) one, it can be very difficult to confirm the diagnosis of FIP.



We want to introduce you to Seymora.

This sweet girl was diagnosed with Feline Infectious Peritonitis (FIP) earlier this year.

FIP is a devastating disease that is unique to cats, sometimes referred to as a 'syndrome' because there are aspects of this disease that are not fully understood.

The disease results from a viral infection called Feline Coronavirus, causing wide-spread and severe inflammation in the body. The resulting inflammation can cause organ failure, fevers that are unresponsive to antibiotics, and in many cases, an accumulation of thick yellow fluid in the chest or abdomen.

FIP can occur at any age but is most common in cats less than one year old because their immune system is not fully developed. The disease was once a death sentence, and many people still believe it is, but it doesn't have to be! Recent studies have shown that there are treatments proven to work in many FIP cases. Unfortunately, the

fact of the matter is the creator of the drug won't release it to be used for FIP treatment yet, so you cannot get it prescribed from a vet. In response, communities have banded together to share this drug with owners who have cats with FIP so that their fur-babies stand a fighting chance!

Seymora needed a blood transfusion to survive. She has slowly gotten better over the last 3 months during her daily treatments. Her bloodwork is on track to being normal, she uses the litterbox successfully now, she's eating and gaining weight. She was only 2.99 pounds at the time of diagnosis and is now over 6 pounds!

To Furry Friends, Seymora is a medical miracle. And will continue to do what needs to be done in order to help treat this new scary disease.
