We are off to a brisk start for 2023. From January 1 to February 20 we have already adopted 106 cats and kittens. Wow! That is a record in such a short amount of time. Keep in mind that more adoptions mean more work for all of our volunteers. They have done a great job of health care, maintenance, sharing love with them and working on socializing them so the kitties can be adopted into good homes.



Volunteer Spotlight: Donne Lankford

Grief over the death of her two elderly kitties brought Donne Lankford to Furry Friends.

When Jack and Rayne, both 14, passed away, Donne was "not in a position to get a new cat"; so she researched volunteer opportunities with cats in Vancouver and found Furry Friends. She has been a member for a year and is a shift lead on Wednesday nights.


"I wash LOTS of dishes, clean rooms and cages, scoop litter boxes, change bedding, give fresh water and food according to the cat's feeding schedule, play with kittens and have full-on conversations with my feline friends," she said.

Donne is a busy worker, indeed. In addition to Wednesday evenings, she volunteers from time to time as a substitute on other shifts. She praises her Wednesday crew.

"My current crew has been together for a good six months now," she said, "and I look forward to seeing and visiting with each one every Wednesday. We have a great team that works well together and each one is always willing to help and handle some not-so-pleasant tasks."

UNO is one lucky kitten

We know it is a little difficult to see these pictures. Just know that Uno is on his way to a much better, pain free life. He is already feeling better. Uno's surgery is one example of the situations that Furry Friends takes care of all the time.

Little Uno came to us after being caught on someone's property with a very obvious eye infection or trauma to the eye. Another rescue organization could not take on his medical care so he was referred to Furry Friends. We quickly took him in. On the day he was brought to us, East Padden Animal Hospital could see him and amazingly enough could do his surgery that evening. Thank you to our friends at EPAH! While we are not sure what caused the trauma, it was deemed a ruptured globe (eyeball) and the eyeball had to come out to prevent further infection.

This 10-week-old, friendly little boy had his bad eye removed, and he was neutered, vaccinated, and microchipped all in the same day that he was saved! He will recover with our Executive Director for a few days and then off to finish his journey with our super fosters, Mike & Tanika Campbell. He is already feeling better since his surgery. 

Declaw Awareness Day- March 29

National Declaw Awareness Day is March 29. Many people think that declawing is a simple, "quick fix" surgery that removes a cat's nails—the equivalent of having your fingernails trimmed. Sadly, this is far from the truth. To declaw a cat, the veterinarian cuts off the last knuckles of a cat's toes — cutting through bone, tendons, skin and nerves. If performed on a human being, it would be like cutting off each finger at the last knuckle.

It is an unnecessary surgery that provides no medical benefit to the cat. Educated pet parents can easily train their cats to use their claws in a manner that allows everyone in the household to live together happily. Pet caregivers should not consider declawing a routine prevention for unwanted scratching. Declawing can actually lead to an entirely different set of behavior problems that may be worse than shredding the couch, such as:

- Litter box avoidance and urinating outside the litterbox
- Increased aggression and biting
- Chronic limping
- Pulling out their own hair

Cats normally walk with their toes bearing the weight of their bodies; each step is cushioned by the pad under the toe. Declawed cats experience extreme pain supporting their body weight when standing or walking, if the tendon attached to the retained segment of the third phalanx pulls that bit of bone under the foot. The displaced bone fragment produces a painful "pebble-in-the-shoe" sensation when they stand or try to walk.

The Paw Project's mission is to educate the public about the painful and crippling effects of feline declawing, to promote animal welfare through the abolition of the practice of declaw surgery, and to rehabilitate cats that have been declawed.

Catios

When you adopt a cat/kitten from Furry Friends, we require that they be indoor only. There are several things you can do to enrich their indoor life. One is to provide them with a catio, which is an enclosure that makes it safe for them to enjoy the outside. These can be as small as a window box or as large as an enclosed patio.

One of our adopters built a small catio that works well.

The adoption of Sofi and Sable from Furry Friends prompted Nanis Gilmore and Philip Parshley to build their own, scaled down version of a kitty "catio."

They were inspired to build a catio after they saw the satisfaction the pair of cats derived from sitting on the windowsill or backslider window gazing out at the garden and the myriad visiting birds. As a remote volunteer at Portland Audubon, Nanis is extremely concerned about the loss of birds due to cat predation, and recalling the window boxes at our shelter house, decided that a "deluxe" window box best suited their own kitties.

Spay-Neuter

Pet overpopulation is a global problem that requires a solution on a global scale. Like every journey that begins with a single step, this journey must begin with every dog and cat owner. Those who do their part act responsibly by spaying and neutering their family pets.

Spaying (ovariohysterectomy) is the surgical removal of a female dog or cat's ovaries and uterus, while neutering (castration) is the removal of a male dog or cat's testicles. To minimize discomfort and pain, both procedures are performed under general anesthesia. Most animals are back to their "normal" selves within a few days, the surgery site usually heals within two weeks, and any skin stitches are removed by one's vet at a follow-up appointment.

According to SPAY USA, an unspayed female dog, her unneutered mate and their offspring (if none are spayed or neutered) result in the births of a staggering 12,288 puppies in just 5 years. An unspayed female and unneutered male cat and their offspring (if none are spayed or neutered) can result in the births of a mind boggling 781,250 kittens in 7 years.
